# **Message from the Outgoing Board Chair**

When I reflect on my term as Commerce Lexington Board Chair, I think about all the ways we collaborated with our local and regional partners to move this organization, our community, and Greater Lexington forward. We are always better together, and that has proven to be true throughout our history – whether in good times or challenging times such as national recessions or global pandemics.

Over the last couple of years, business leaders and elected officials across our nine-county region developed a Regional Competitiveness Plan aimed at making Greater Lexington more economically competitive for jobs and talent. The plan focuses on areas such as economic development, talent recruitment and retention, and advocacy. The Regional Leadership Council has begun the implementation process for several key action items

with a goal of increasing jobs, median wages, and GDP within the region to at least the national average. At the Regional Summit in late November, there was great energy and enthusiasm as we discussed the overall strategy, goals, and success metrics. Stay tuned for much more on the regional plan over the next few years.

In June, I was pleased to lead a delegation of 170 area business, education, government, and nonprofit leaders to Grand Rapids, Michigan for our annual Leadership Visit. These community-building visits provide great opportunities to examine what other cities and regions are doing well, while looking inward at how we can improve our own community and region. I would highly encourage you to consider participating in the 2024 Leadership Visit to Salt Lake City, June 5-7.

Commerce Lexington continues to provide resources for small and minority-owned businesses across our community. From networking and educational events to programs like our recently launched Peer Groups, the Business Owners' Advisory Boards, and the Money Smart for Small Business classes, Commerce Lexington is there to provide you with the tools for success. Since 2001, the innovative Access Loan Program has facilitated over \$24 million dollars in approved loans for small business start-ups and expansions through the assistance of 26 participating lenders. Over the last ten years, the Minority Business Accelerator has helped ethnic-minority-owned businesses achieve procurement contracts totaling nearly \$50 million.

In the area of public policy, Commerce Lexington was at the forefront of advocating for more balanced land use policies in Fayette County, so that all of our residents can find good housing at an affordable price and businesses can locate and expand here. The Comprehensive Plan process included more diverse voices and segments of our community than ever before, while we ensured that accurate data related to vacant and available land was being presented in meetings. We appreciate the Urban County Council for recognizing the need to provide additional land within the Urban Services Boundary for housing and jobs along with improved strategies to leverage infill and redevelopment opportunities. By working together, Lexington is better positioned to be a Lexington for everyone.

As my time as Board Chair comes to a close, I want to thank the staff, board, and many of you within our membership who helped advance our mission to increase business success and economic prosperity across the community. It's been an honor for me to serve as your chair, and I look forward to seeing all that we will accomplish together in the future.

# **Workforce Town Hall Discussion**

Commerce Lexington's Cheryl Klever joined a variety of businesses, government officials, and educational leaders to attend a workforce discussion hosted by Team Kentucky and the Kentucky Career Center. Conversations focused on state and local workforce strategies and operations, including their successes and challenges. Guests were encouraged to share ideas that reimagine the workforce system to support a wider scope of career seekers and better serve businesses in attracting and retaining qualified diverse talent. Engaging with our workforce partners helps position our team as we strive to strengthen our region's workforce and talent pipelines to ensure we are meeting employer and economic development needs.

# Bluegrass AgTech Development Corp. Announces Grant Program

During a recent press conference, the Bluegrass AgTech Development Corp. announced a new incentive program designed to encourage agtech and food-based businesses to locate in Kentucky. Each applicant may apply for up to \$100,000 of grant funding in the first year of the program. Selected grant recipients will also be offered resource support, such as mentorship, referrals to professional services, connections to local growers and research teams, and other business development assistance. Applicants must be able to provide a 100% match. The program is open to registered, for-profit businesses currently located in or willing to establish a presence in Lexington or Kentucky, with an emphasis on startups and early-stage businesses. Applications are available on-line at https://bluegrassagtech.org and must be completed by February 15, 2024.

# STAT: Critical Role of Airports in Economic Development Process

In this month's stat spotlight, we underline the critical role of airports in economic development. Airports are more than transportation hubs; they function as catalysts for business growth, tourism, and employment. Lexington is uniquely advantaged with the presence of the Blue Grass Airport, conveniently



located less than fifteen minutes from downtown and the interstate. This small yet efficient airport offers excellent services and personalized passenger experience. Adding to Lexington's strategic position are the airports of Louisville and Cincinnati/Northern Kentucky, expanding our access to over 100 direct flight options within an hour's drive time. For comparison, there is one airport within 75 miles of both Nashville and Indianapolis, with each offering 95 and 40 direct flights, respectively. The close proximity of our trio of airports broadens the Greater Lexington Region's international reach and business opportunities, providing a competitive edge in a globalized economy. For the Greater Lexington Region, airport accessibility is not just a convenience; it's an asset that fuels economic growth and development.



# Clean Slate Conference & Clinic Provides Important Resources

From a top-shelf performing arts scene, to award-winning dining, craft beer, and distilling culture, this Old West town has become a forward-thinking, and burgeoning urban hub. There will be a lot for us to learn during this trip - from Salt Lake's thriving tech industry to its exceptional quality of life and efforts in the talent attraction space. It is also home to the Huntsman Cancer Institute, a nationally-recognized cancer hospital and research center and benchmark institute for the UK Markey Cancer Center.

# Leadership Lexington Alumni Participate in Ripple Effects Mapping

At Commerce Lexington, we are always proud to champion programs that empower, educate, and inspire leaders in our community. Our signature leadership development program, Leadership Lexington, has been

doing just that for more than 40 years. Recently, a group of Leadership Lexington alumni took part in a unique exercise called "Ripple Effects Mapping" to measure the profound impact this program has had on our community.



The results of the study are in, and we are excited to share them with you. On August 30, 2023, a group of twenty-three alumni, representing classes from 1980 to 2023, gathered at the Lexington Central Public Library. Facilitated by Dr. Nicole Breazeale and Ruthie Caldwell, they embarked on a journey to explore the effects of this remarkable program, using an evaluation method that combines storytelling, mind mapping, group interviews, and qualitative data analysis. The purpose was simple yet profound: to map the chain of effects resulting from Leadership Lexington.

Now, months later, the final report is ready to be revealed - sharing the detailed ripple effects that Leadership Lexington has had on our community.

# **Leadership Lexington:**

# 1. Promotes Diversity & Cross-Cultural Collaboration

Leadership Lexington has emerged as a beacon of diversity and inclusion. Classes are intended to reflect the diversity of our community, and for over a decade leadership has worked intentionally to make sure the environment is inclusive. Through open, honest conversations, it brings people from all walks of life together to learn from current leaders and each other. Participants connect on a human level and have been inspired to spark diversity initiatives in their workplaces. It's not just about discussing differences; it's about understanding, respecting, and making positive changes in our lives and in our community.

#### 2. Stimulates Personal Growth

Our mission: "Challenge the Mind, Open the Heart, Enrich the Spirit" shows that this program is more than just a series of classes. It's a transformative experience that pushes participants beyond their comfort zones. It helps individuals become more self-aware and empathetic. Participants are able to identify personal strengths and learn how to work with others of varying strengths. Finally, through experiential leadership development in the class project experience, they have a platform to practice and develop skills to become better leaders, both in their organizations and in their lives.

#### 3. Anchors Leaders to Community

Leadership Lexington fosters deep connections and bonds among its participants and alumni. It's not just a networking opportunity; it's a family. Participants often support one another during personal struggles, crises, and even when pursuing public office. It roots individuals in the community and makes them feel part of something bigger than themselves.

#### 4. Helps Local Organizations Prosper

As participants grow personally and professionally, they share their new skills and connections with their employers, which in turn, strengthens local organizations. It boosts sales for businesses, provides access to high-quality job candidates or board members, and improves fundraising and volunteer recruitment for nonprofits.

#### 5. Moves Leaders to Action

Leadership Lexington doesn't just create leaders; it inspires them to make a difference. Emerging leaders find their purpose and are empowered to put their energy into community causes that matter most to them. This program fosters an environment that helps turn ideas into action for the common good. These impacts are tangible, farreaching, and awe-inspiring, and they've given our community a sense of pride and commitment to staying right here in Lexington. Participants have not only benefited from this program; they've given back to our community in immeasurable ways.

The Ripple Effects Mapping process captured the impact of Leadership Lexington, but it's not the end of the story. It's just the beginning. As we move forward, we will use these results to continue growing and evolving the Leadership Lexington program. By focusing on what's working well and identifying areas for improvement, we can make an even greater impact on our community. This report serves as a roadmap for our future discussions and projects, all aimed at expanding the reach and influence of Leadership Lexington.

# **Leadership Lexington Session Covers Economic Development**

# Recap by Logan Sparks, Central Bank Center

On November 9th, the Leadership Lexington class spent the day learning about economic development and the business development community in Lexington. We began the day at Lexmark hearing about Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government's general economic development agenda from Kevin Atkins, Chief Development Officer. His presentation highlighted several programs that are working to bring business to our community, as well as several programs working to enhance the business that already exists here. He also discussed the different

factors that companies and organizations consider when deciding to bring their business to Lexington, specifically mentioning that clients almost always mention how friendly, accommodating and nice Lexingtonians are.

Throughout the rest of the morning, the group heard from several community members representing the Urban League of Lexington through a panel led by Annissa Franklin, Vice President. I specifically appreciated Annissa's discussion with Miranda Scully, Director of Family and Community Engagement with Fayette County Public Schools, during which they explained the importance of educating the entire family, not just the child, and the positive impact that that philosophy can have on communities.

The group relocated to the Link Belt Excavators Customer Experience Center for lunch and the afternoon activities. First, Gina Greathouse, EVP for Economic Development with Commerce Lexington, explained in great detail the process in which she and her team work to bring new companies into Lexington,



including the site selection process, how they identify strategic targets, property search, etc. After Gina's presentation, the class broke into smaller groups to engage in a site selection simulation. Three groups represented cities and the other three groups represented companies looking to either start or relocate businesses. The simulation was so fun and demonstrated the innumerable factors that organizations take into consideration when selecting a site, sometimes even including horseracing and bourbon.

Overall, the sentiment highlighted throughout the entire day that was most memorable to me is that economic development is not just a business of numbers, tax incentives, etc. Rather, meaningful economic development is a healthy balance of managing business and the environment and community that a city provides, reminding us all that we each have a part in economic development for Lexington through our daily actions, the causes that we care about, and how we take care of our fellow man.
