Niki Goldey represented the Economic Development team at the International BIO show in Boston, June 5-8. Kentucky Trifecta, the Kentucky delegation, included members from University of Kentucky Innovate, KY Science & Technology Corporation, University of Louisville, Louisville Forward, UPS, and several Kentucky based biotech companies. More than 14,000+ international and domestic biotechnology and pharma leaders from across the country and around the world attended the event to network, learn about innovative technologies, discuss research prospects, and discover new opportunities.

FCPS - "A Seat at the Table" Event

Community and Minority Business Development partnered with Fayette County Public Schools (FCPS) for "A Seat at the Table" on June 8, featuring guest speaker Rita McNeil Danish, CEO of Signal Ohio and Founder, CEO and Principal of JD2 Strategists, LLC. The event provided business owners an opportunity to hear about the positive changes FCPS has made and participate in a discussion about greater inclusion.

To increase the inclusion of Minority Business Enterprises (MBE's), Women Business Enterprises (WBE's), and Veteran Business Enterprises (VBE's), FCPS has updated the Board of Education's Purchasing Policy to include more language to support the inclusion of MBE's, WBE's, and VBE's. Diversity, Equity, Inclusion, and Belonging (DEIB) Leads in schools will now also function as supplier diversity advocates. In the fall, FCPS will present awards to Supplier Diversity Champions, recognizing those schools and departments with the greatest percentage increase in spending with MBE's, WBE's, and VBE's. In addition, FCPS will conduct mandatory Safe School Training modules on purchasing and supplier diversity, implement the three envelope system for construction bids, and foster the newly formed partnerships with 7PM Group and KY Apex Accelerator.

The event concluded with a guest panel of industry experts, state legislators and others who are committed to supplier diversity. The panel host was Emmy-winning journalist and television host, Sherelle Roberts.

Legacy Business Park Receives KPDI Funding

To enhance continued economic development growth, the Kentucky Cabinet for Economic Development and the Kentucky Association for Economic Development are working together to implement the Kentucky Product Development Initiative (KPDI). Designed to support upgrades to industrial sites around the state, the KPDI program includes \$100 million in state funding which can be accessed by communities to make existing sites more attractive for potential projects.

Lexington applied for and secured \$2 Million in funding from the KPDI program for the 200-acre Legacy Business Park located along I-64/I-75 near the Coldstream Research Campus. Work will begin later this year to extend and improve infrastructure to the site. In total, more than \$6 million in improvements will be made to the site.



STAT: Survey Asks Foreign Investors to Rank Workforce, Talent Concerns

The Financial Times-Nikkei US City FDI Rankings is an annual report that ranks cities in the United States by their success in attracting foreign direct investment (FDI). The report evaluates cities based on several factors including FDI strategy, economic potential, business friendliness, human capital and lifestyle, and connectivity. Out of a 100 score, Lexington scored a perfect 100 on aftercare, which is based on a survey of the city's long-term support of existing companies. Another top concern for foreign investors was workforce and talent and the chart below shows the importance of a college educated population for companies considering locations. Commerce Lexington's Economic Development team contacts over 150 businesses within the community each year to provide support for the various challenges and opportunities companies face in their efforts to grow and prosper in Central Kentucky.




Bluegrass Tech Task Force

Commerce Lexington is working alongside community partners and tech employers to address this important sector and find ways to enhance the industry in the Greater Lexington Region. In September, the group analyzed various factors that affect the tech industry and decided to focus on the following initial topics.

- > Employ Grow existing and attract new employers of tech professionals by having the right tech skills available in the Bluegrass;
- > Engage Build a vibrant, engaged local tech community through dynamic meetups, events, and conferences;
- > Educate Develop an effective technical education pipeline integrated with employer and employee needs from primary and postsecondary schools in the region; and
- > Enable Build an ecosystem of internships and apprenticeships that provide growth opportunities for all levels of tech students.

Each member joined a committee and worked to research strengths, weaknesses, opportunities, and threats to develop a plan of action and ways to influence success. The team regrouped last month to collaborate and build upon each topic to achieve the goal of growing jobs and employers in the region. On July 26-27, more than 40 regional business and community leaders travel to the nation's Capital for the annual **Washington**, **D.C. Fly-In presented by Columbia Gas of Kentucky**. During the two-day visit, leaders will meet with members of Kentucky's Congressional Delegation and staff about priority issues to enhance regional competitiveness. In addition, participants the opportunity to hear from various leaders and policy experts about key issues such as tax and regulatory reform, immigration and other workforce issues.

Attendees on the trip are diverse and represent various sectors of the regional economy such as government, banking, health care, non-profit, education, manufacturing, energy, and professional services. Members of the delegation act as "policy ambassadors" for Central Kentucky. They share the issue concerns of the business community with members of Congress, and advocate for policies or projects aimed at making the region a better place to live and work.

The Bluegrass Region's D.C. Fly-In is organized by Commerce Lexington and the Central Kentucky Public Policy Group. Members of the Central Kentucky Policy Group are responsible for crafting the federal policy agenda each year. The group includes business, community and government leaders within the nine-county region of Bourbon, Clark, Fayette, Franklin, Jessamine, Madison, Montgomery, Scott, and Woodford counties.

Council Approves Updated Comprehensive Plan Goals & Objectives Planning Commission to Identify Between 2,700-5,000 Acres for Expansion Area

On June 15th, the Lexington-Fayette Urban County Council approved the updated 2045 Comprehensive Plan Goals & Objectives by a vote of 13-2. During three months of discussion and debate, Councilmembers thoughtfully approached this process to ensure the plan reflects the needs of our diverse community. The Comprehensive Plan prior-

itizes addressing housing affordability and job creation needs, while balancing the need to preserve and protect our unique agriculture land.

It also emphasizes housing affordability solutions such as exploring opportunities for unused and underused city-owned land to be developed for affordable housing developments and adopts a reasonable and responsible "two-step approach" to addressing short-term and long-term needs to our city's growth and development and expansion of the Urban Service Area.

Other key points of the updated to the Goals & Objectives:

- By December 1, 2024, the Planning Commission is to identify between 2,700-5,000 acres for expansion near major transportation corridors and develop an Expansion Area Master Plan for the identified areas with an emphasis on creating opportunities for affordable housing and jobs.
- By August 1, 2026, a long-term growth management process is to be completed to guide future expansion decisions.

Our community cannot afford to wait another 5-10 years for more study and a growth process to be implemented. Development takes time, and our community is already behind.

- Less than 4% of land within the current boundary is <u>vacant and</u> <u>available</u> land for housing and jobs needs.
- Home prices have skyrocketed more than 80 percent over the last ten years.
- · The city is losing population.
- · Land for job creation is limited to a handful of sites.

A delegation of about 170 Central Kentucky business, education, government, and nonprofit leaders recently took part in Commerce Lexington's Leadership Visit to Grand Rapids, Michigan. One of the longest-running and largest intercity trips of its kind among chambers of commerce nationally, these annual community-building visits provide great opportunities to examine what other cities and regions are doing well and look inward at how we can improve Lexington and Central Kentucky.

During the trip, participants visited the global headquarters of Steelcase, the leading manufacturer of furniture for offices, hospitals and classrooms. The group also heard how Grand Rapids has expanded its health care industry through the growth of the Medical Mile and plans to become a major tech hub in the Midwest by growing 20,000 new tech jobs over the next ten years. In addition, representatives from Grand

Action 2.0 discussed how they have fostered public-private collaborations to create transformational projects in Grand Rapids. In addition to the sessions, participants experienced Grand Rapids on their own or through a variety of elective tours and lunches covering topics like downtown development, diversity and inclusion, housing affordability, the area's well-known beer culture, and more.

Throughout the trip, attendees were asked to pay special attention to the stories that made Grand Rapids what it is today in preparation for an interactive discussion about Lexington on the final day of the trip. As participants considered a variety of introspective questions both individually and in groups, Commerce Lexington partnered with local artist and illustrator, Bryce Oquaye, to create a graphic illustration in real-time that represented the group's comments about Lexington's future story.




