Kentucky Association of Manufacturers Hosts Central Kentucky Regional Briefing

In September, Cheryl Klever from the Commerce Lexington economic development team visited Bluegrass Community and Technical College's Advanced Manufacturing Center in Georgetown to attend the Central Kentucky Regional Briefing presented Kentucky Association Manufacturers (KAM), an



organization that advocates to promote and grow manufacturing in the Commonwealth. Frank Jemley, President and CEO of KAM, and Dr. Greg Feeney, acting President and CEO of BCTC, welcomed guests to receive updates on the latest developments on legislative issues impacting business and manufacturing in Kentucky. The Manufacturers Panel included representation from Toyota Motor Manufacturing, Piston Group, and Link-Belt Cranes. The Service Provider Panel included the Kentucky Career Center, Office of Employer & Apprenticeship Services, Kentucky Chamber of Commerce, and BCTC's Workforce Solutions. State Representative Phillip Pratt and Georgetown Mayor Burney Jenkins attended to hear legislative remarks from U.S. Congressman Andy Barr.

E.D. Team Hosts Bluegrass Station Eat n' Greet

In September, the Commerce Lexington economic development team visited Bluegrass Station, a Department of Defense-style campus that provides logistical and operational support to several government and private industry tenants, to tour its campus, vacant buildings, and Lockheed Martin Corporation. The event finalized with a luncheon for the tenants occupying space at the business park. Participants had an opportunity to introduce themselves, their companies, and talk about the ways each business operates within the state and nationwide. In return, we introduced our team, shared a presentation about Commerce Lexington and its programs, focusing on economic development initiatives to find out how we can support each business with their growth endeavors.

STAT: Lexington Among Best Cities to Drive In

Data from the U.S. Census Bureau shows most Americans rely on cars for daily travel needs, with more than 85% of workers commuting to work by car. The 2022 Global Traffic Scorecard, an annual analysis done by INRIX, found American drivers lost an average of 50 hours annually due to traffic congestion. As the second-largest metro in Kentucky, Lexington experiences varying levels of traffic congestion depending on the time of day and specific location, causing an overall impact of 22 hours lost due to traffic delays last year. Out of



100 of the largest U.S. cities, Lexington ranked 16th among the Best Cities to Drive In, according to a 2022 report by WalletHub. The study evaluates various factors such as traffic congestion, infrastructure quality, gas prices, and safety to determine the overall driver friendliness of each city. As these reports illustrate, in Lexington commuters are fortunate to have a well-maintained road system that is easy to navigate during non-peak hours, reducing the number of hours lost while commuting.

Bespoken Spirits, LLC Relocates to Lexington

spirits brand, has relocated its headquarters manufacturing operation to ${\mathfrak Q}$ Lexington! Looking to tap Kentucky's robust



distilling network and capitalize on the strategic advantages surrounding Kentucky's bourbon supply chain, partnerships, and workforce, Bespoken Spirits will provide 17 high-wage positions with an average salary of \$128,000 annually including benefits, as they grow their operation right here in the heart of Bourbon country. Capital investment for this project is estimated at \$3.2 million. We look forward to celebrating their grand opening at Greyline Station in 2024.

The economic development team loves to engage in interactive community discussions to share practical information about Lexington's economic strength and potential. Commerce Lexington's President and CEO Bob Quick (pictured below) recently served as the Lexington Expert at United Real Estate's monthly "Ask an Expert" luncheon. Agents also learned about the region's robust educational systems and its alignment with the needs of the ever-evolving workforce.

Program to remove unused opioids from Kentuckians' medicine cabinets; and investigating and prosecuting rogue doctors and drug traffickers.





Leadership Central Kentucky Orientation Sets Stage for Regionalism

Gathering at the Historic Boone Tavern in Berea, our two-day Orientation for Leadership Central Kentucky marked the start of a profound leadership journey. The picturesque setting framed a day of dynamic exercises that underlined the intricate nature of leadership. From sorting ourselves silently by birthdates to precise object throws, we grasped the complexity of leading in diverse settings and how coordination is essential for success.

Key takeaways included the concept of trust accounts, vital for strong leadership. We explored the "love languages" of an apology, illuminating ways to rebuild trust. Effective team dynamics were another focus, addressing the five dysfunctions that hinder success. Promoting healthy conflict emerged as a key theme, fueling high-performing teams.

From concepts for self-leadership to organizational leadership, our two-day orientation

retreat aimed to foster lasting connections. The session to define regionalism, regional issues, successes, and concerns in Central Kentucky proved instrumental in shaping our purpose.

The creative exercise to generate our "I am from" poems fostered an immediate sense of unity among classmates, underscoring the power of diverse perspectives in leadership.

"What does it look like to be on the other side of your leadership?" prompted deep self reflection about the aspects of leadership we reviewed and how we can apply them to be the best leaders we can possibly be.

I left Boone Tavern committed to leadership, trust, and regional unity. I am certainly primed for inspiration and collaboration in the days ahead, as we work in the "stretch zone" for growth and to fulfill our shared vision for regionalism.

Leadership Lexington Class Explores Lexington's Rich History

On August 14th, the Leadership Lexington spent the day learning about Lexington's history. Fellow class member and Executive Director of the Lexington History Museum, Dr. Mandy Higgins, gave an overview of our city's history. Dr. Higgins encouraged the class to view history as an argument that challenges us and our ways of thinking.

Class participants then visited the Kentucky Room at the Lexington Public Library, which features a collection of books and archives, such as the second issue of the *Kentucky Gazette*. A visit to the Lexington History Museum allowed participants to take a personal tour throughout Lexington's history, learning about the agricultural history of Fayette County, the Civil Rights Movement in Lexington, the impact of IBM, and more.

Eric Brooks and Jim Clark from Ashland: The Henry Clay Estate shared about the history of the estate, as well as their efforts to improve the telling

of the history of those enslaved at Ashland through the new "Traces" tour. Local historian, Yvonne Giles, then led participants on a mobile tour of African American Heritage throughout the city

Lastly, class participants visited the Lyric Theatre and Cultural Arts Center, which was an entertainment center and cultural hub for Lexington's African American community from 1948-1963. Meaning Black Men." Keeneland's Exhibit Curator, Roda Ferraro, also joined the group to share more about "The Heart of the Turf: Racing's Black Pioneers," which is currently on exhibit at The Lyric.

As Dr. Higgins mentioned, historical thinking is a leadership skill. The day was a wonderful opportunity to learn more about Lexington history, while engaging in challenging, yet important conversations.
